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



12th Sept Mindfulness Day

Query: How do we introduce mindfulness and meditation in children's routines? My 10 year old gets very frustrated and gives up when things don't go her way, and I would like to help her stay calm in such situations.

Answer: We can see children being stressed out these days. While meditation is an appropriate way to help them stay calm, we find it challenging to make them sit for meditation.

Let us first understand the fundamental difference between Mindfulness and Meditation -

Mindfulness is the quality of mind, to be aware in the present moment while Meditation is a practice where an individual uses a technique – such as mindfulness or focusing the mind on a particular object, thought, or activity – to train attention and awareness, and achieve a mentally clear and emotionally calm and stable state" (Walsh and Shapiro, 2006).

Here are some simple ways to introduce mindfulness and meditation for kids -

- 1) Use the humming sound Kids have high energy, and are sometimes unable to concentrate in class or at home. Before doing any activity, ask your child to close her eyes and make a humming sound from the throat. Repeat this 3 to 4 times. The child will be calmer and quiet and in a state to listen to instructions.
- 2) Use breathing and drawing together Make your child stand in front of a blank wall. Ask her to color the whole wall with her favorite color (only in imagination!) while inhaling and exhaling deeply. Repeat this 10 times. Once the task is done, ask her to rub her palms, and place them in front of her eyes. Ask her what she imagined, once she opens her eyes. I'm sure you will be surprised!
- 3) Relaxing Ask your child to lie down or sit comfortably. Gradually ask her to take deep breaths; breathing in and out. Take her attention to her right toe, asking her to relax all the muscles of the right toe. Guide her slowly by relaxing each muscle. This will lead to sound sleep and complete body relaxation. In case the child has high energy, this will make the child calmer!

Meditation and mindfulness are everyday exercises.

- Inculcate the habit of being silent for a few minutes every day.
- Remind your kids to relax and take a few deep breaths as they wake up every morning.
- Encourage children to incorporate deep breathing as a daily bedtime

This will slowly become a routine for them and perhaps this practice would be the most valuable thing you could ever give your child!

TEACHINGS ON TEACHING!





UV FOUNDATION brings to you the writings of **Thiruvalluvar**, the great Tamil saint, on the occasion of **Teacher**'s Day! The kural numbers are listed within the article!

What does a teacher do?

The common goal of mankind is happiness. The key to uninterrupted peace-filled happiness is contained in our ancient wisdom. This wisdom is handed down from a Guru (teacher) to a Shishya (student). By sharing his knowledge, a teacher spreads the happiness that he experiences. (#399).

What impact does the teaching have?

The best way to attain knowledge is by learning under a competent Guru who has also learnt methodically under a Guru.

Just like one needs eyes and light to see, a Guru lights the lamp of knowledge and removes the darkness of ignorance by opening our inner eye, making us see things in the right perspective (#355, #445). Without the knowledge acquired from a Guru, one may get misled into believing untruths (#423).

How does it happen?

How ever complex the subject or the situation is, the Guru resolves it effortlessly and makes it easy. They are so learned that they grasp subtle concepts and explain it in a simple manner to make one understand (#424).

The need for a Guide

Knowledge can help us predict where we could go wrong and be forewarned where we might face an issue. It is important to have the fear to avoid doing what is wrong. Equipping oneself with mechanisms to prevent possible problems is intelligence (#427-#429). Befriending such knowledgeable people paves the path for the right knowledge transfer. One should cherish such relationships (#425,#441,#442).

Till when does one need a Teacher/Guru?

No matter how much one may rise to the top, one still needs a learned guide; as without their company and conditioning, one would fail even without an external enemy. On the contrary, no enemy can defeat the one who has the strength of a learned guide. (#446, #448).


Secret of Success

- Listen to the learned.
- Listening to the learned carefully equips you with communication skills. You will never go wrong in what you say (#417, #419).
- If you face a downfall, what you have learnt comes handy like a staff (thick stick) on a slippery surface and motivates you (#414,#415).
- Your success is directly proportional to your learning (#396, #416).

So, learn! Learn what ought to be learnt! Learn from the learned! Keep learning!

This is the message of Thiruvalluvar covered in the topics (Adhikarams) titled Kalvi, Kelvi, Arivudaimai and Periyarai Thunaikodal!

EIDGAH



Dhanpat Rai Srivastava, known by his pen name as **Munshi Premchand**, is well known for his literature in Hindi and Urdu. He was among the first authors to write about social causes of that time. Here's a touching story about a little boy and his grandmother, translated to English by Khushwant singh, and abridged here.

How wonderful is the morning of Eid! The trees look greener, the field more festive, the sky has a lovely pink glow. The village is agog with excitement!

The day most awaited by the boys had finally come. They're excited to celebrate - not bothered whether there was enough milk and sugar for the (sevaiyyaan) vermicelli pudding. All they want is to eat the pudding!

They keep recounting the treasure in their pockets. Mahmood has 12 pice*, Mohsin has 15. Out of this countless hoard, they will buy countless things: toys, sweets, paper-pipes, rubber balls— and much more.

The happiest of the boys is Hamid. He is only four; poorly dressed, thin and famished-looking. Even though he was an orphan, his grandmother Ameena tells him that his father has gone to earn money and will return with sack loads of silver. And that his mother has gone to Allah to get lovely gifts for him. This makes Hamid very happy.

It is great to live on hope; for a child there is nothing like hope. A child's imagination can turn a mustard seed into a mountain. Hamid believes that when his parents come back he will be able to fulfil all his heart's desires. Then he will have more than Mahmood, Mohsin, Noorey and Sammi.

Ameena, on the other hand, laments about not having any money for Eid. She's also worried about sending Hamid to the fair all by himself. Hamid assures her that he will be alright, and sets off with his friends.

Crossing the town suburbs, big buildings and beautifully decorated sweet shops, finally, the **Eidgah** comes in view. **Here, neither wealth nor status matters because in the eyes of God all are equal**. After the prayer, people embrace each other. They descend on the sweet and toy-vendors' stores like an army moving to an assault. In this matter, the grown-up rustic is no less eager than the boys.

As his friends pay and enjoy the swings and roundabouts, Hamid simply watches them. He couldn't afford to part with his treasure of 3 pice. The children then proceed to toy stalls, complete with soldiers and milkmaids, kings and ministers, water-carriers and washerwomen and holy men.

Mahmood buys a policeman in khaki with a red turban on his head and a gun on his shoulder. Mohsin likes the water-carrier with his back bent under the weight of the water- bag. Noorey has fallen for the lawyer. What an expression of learning he has on his face!

These toys cost 2 pice each. How can Hamid afford to buy such expensive toys? What would he do with them? They were made of clay, and may break, or the paint may run off. They'd be of no use to him.

Mohsin says, "My water-carrier will sprinkle water every day, morning and evening."

Mahmood says, "My policeman will guard my house. If a thief comes near, he will shoot him with his gun.

Noorey says, "My lawyer will fight my cases."

Sammi says, "My washer-woman will wash my clothes every day."

Hamid pooh-poohs their toys, but he wishes he could hold them in his hands for just a moment. But young boys are not givers, particularly when it is something new. Poor Hamid doesn't get to touch the toys.

After the toys, it is sweets. Someone buys sesame seed candy, others gulab jamuns or halva. They smack their lips with relish. Only Hamid is left out. He looks with hungry eyes at the others.



"In your heart you must be saying, 'If I could get it I would eat it," says Mohsin. "Why don't you take the money out of your pocket?"

"I know what this clever fellow is up to," says Mahmood. "When we've spent all our money, he will buy sweets and tease us."

After the sweet-vendors, there are a few hardware stores and shops of real and artificial jewelry. There is nothing there to attract the boys' attention. So they go ahead—all of them except Hamid who stops to see a pile of tongs.

It occurs to him that his granny does not have them. Each time she bakes chapattis, the iron plate burns her hands. If he buy her these tongs she would be very pleased and never burn her fingers; it would be a useful thing to have in the house. What use are toys? They are a waste of money. You can have some fun with them but only for a very short time. Then you forget all about them.

After bargaining for a bit, the shopkeeper relents and gives him the tongs for 3 pice. Hamid carries it on his shoulder as if it were a gun and struts up proudly to show it to his friends. Now it was Hamid's turn to show off his new 'toy'.

"Place them across your shoulders and it is a gun; wield them in your hands and it is like the tongs carried by singing mendicants—they can make the same clanging as a pair of cymbals. One smack and they will reduce all your toys to dust. And much as your toys may try they could not bend a hair on the head of my tongs. My tongs are like a brave tiger."

The tongs win over everyone to their side. The boys begin to make terms of peace. The tongs pass from one hand to another; and the toys are in turn handed to Hamid. How lovely they are!

By eleven the village was again agog with excitement. All those who had gone to the fair were back at home.

As soon as she heard his voice, Granny Ameena ran out of the house, picked him up and kissed him. Suddenly she noticed the tongs in his hand. "Where did you find these tongs?"

"I bought them at the fair for three pice."

Granny Ameena cried out. "It is almost noon and you haven't had anything to eat or drink. And what do you buy— tongs! Couldn't you find anything better in the fair than this pair of iron tongs?"

Hamid replied in injured tones, "You burn your fingers on the iron plate. That is why I bought them."

The old woman's temper suddenly changed to lovenot the kind of calculated love, which wastes away in spoken words.

This love was mute, solid and seeped with tenderness. What a selfless child! What concern for others! What a big heart! How he must have suffered seeing other boys buying toys and gobbling sweets! How was he able to suppress his own feelings! Even at the fair he thought of his old grandmother.

Granny Ameena's heart was too full for words.

And the strangest thing happened—stranger than the part played by the tongs, was the role of Hamid-the-child playing Hamid-the-old-man. And old Granny-Ameena became Ameena-the-little-girl.

She broke down. She spread her apron and beseeched Allah's blessings for her grandchild. Big tears fell from her eyes. How was Hamid to understand what was going on inside her!

- They're not nuts! Coconuts are Stone Fruits (Drupes)!
- Coconut trees live up to 80-90 years!
- The coconut tree (Cocos Nucifera) is also known as the **Tree**Of Life, because humans use all parts of the coconut tree from bottom to top!
- The name "Coconut" is taken from the Portuguese word "Coco", which means Monkey Face, or Grinning Face!
- Sindbad the Sailor sold coconuts on his 5th Voyage, as told in the Tale of the Arabian Nights!
- It is believed that the coconut fruit can travel up to 100 days in the ocean and still germinate!
- The Orange coconut species can take over 5 years to flower!

The coconut tree is the National Tree of Maldives!



Leaves: Woven into roofs or walls; used in cooking and handicrafts. Dried leaves produce good-quality paper pulp. The sturdy ribs are used to make brooms etc.


Coconut: The hard husk becomes coir used to make commercial products like brushes, carpets etc.

The shell can be burned to make fuel or charcoal or used to make lamps, pots etc.

The meat is used for coconut milk, cooking and also animal feeds. It also produces coconut oil. Coconut water helps balance the electrolytes in the body.

Trunk: made into charcoal and lumber for building construction and making furniture, jewelry, ornaments, and shampoo. The bark is also used in making paper pulp.

Roots: The roots are made into rope or twine and can be used for making beverages, dyes, medicines, etc.

DAYA PATKI Bamboo Tantra Raigad

"The bamboo that bends is stronger than the oak that resists." - Japanese Proverb.

While raw strength is important, the ability to bend and adapt is far more valuable. And surprisingly enough, it's true that the wood from a flexible bamboo cane is stronger than the wood from a rigid oak tree!

Let's hear from Ms. Daya Patki, who along with her father Mr. Anand Patki maintains a bamboo farm at Raigad. She also runs Bamboo Tantra (@bambootantrapune), where unique bamboo jewelry from artisans are showcased for sales. She offers some cool insights about this wonderful grass - No it's not a tree!

Bamboo is the most sustainable natural material! When a tree is chopped, it may not regrow. But bamboo once harvested (first harvest is after 6 years), it fetches new bamboo poles every year!


The **fibrous root spread** of bamboo is very good, and it helps **controlling soil erosion**! Some species have stronger roots that can also hold on to boulders thereby **avoiding landslides**!

There are around **140** species recorded in **India**, and around **1800** gazetted **uses** of bamboo! Food, jewelry, furniture, flooring and roofing, cutlery, vessels, toothbrushes, fabric are just a few of them!

Lets learn some cool tongue twisting bamboo names!

Schizostachyum Dulloa Bamboo is peeled until we get very thin jewelry grade thread, which is soaked in water to become flexible and then woven. Once dry, varnish is applied and it becomes shiny and water resistant and ready to wear!

Dendrocalamus Longispathus is used in furniture, handicrafts, bamboo biriyani, and edible bamboo shoots!



Do you know? Bamboo is the fastest growing "woody" grass!

While other grasses flower every year, bamboo flowers only once in its lifetime!

Bamboos can last from 30 to 90 years!

The name bamboo was first used in the Indonesia archipelago. The word comes from the onomatopoeia for the sound of hollow canes knocking together.

Bamboo also has strong carbon-absorbing properties that purify the air!










